Spirit at Model United Nations has drawn its curtains on an absolute whirlwind of a week, and we are thrilled to wrap up what can only be described as a comprehensive success, albeit one filled with the uniquely chaotic energy of young diplomats.

From the moment the first gavel struck until the final cheer of the closing ceremony, the conference was a triumph of execution and community spirit. The planning team worked tirelessly to ensure flawless logistics, which largely held, allowing debates to flow smoothly and effectively.


To top it off, the Senior School boys spiked up the energy in a thrilling friendly volleyball match against their teachers — a true showdown of experience vs. youthful energy!
